RiVeR, PLaiNS aND MuDeJaR STvLe

he landscape of the north-eastern corner of Salamanca province is characterised by its soft hills and large cereal-covered plains. interrupted here and there by the dense forest areas known as dehesas. There also those little wetlands which, much like oasis, break with its greenery and the bustle of their feathered inhabitants an chromatic palette where otherwise the predominant colours are othres and vellows.




It is in this hilly territory where the towns of Peñaranda de Bracamonte and Alba de Tormes rise. Like poles that complement and attract each other, these towns are set apart, one by its location at the crossing of a thousand roads and the other, by its proximity to the River Tormes.

The river, here in its middle section, seems to slow down before passing by Salamanca city, which can be almost felt not far away. And it is precisely the short distance between Alba de Tormes and Salamanca, just 22 kilometres, what makes it the ideal destination for those who, while visiting the capital, would like to spend a day getting to know the area around it.

Another interesting aspect for those willing to visit these lands, which belong to the natural areas of Tierra de Peñaranca and Tierra de Alba, is the group of small Mudeiar churches hidden in many of the villages along the Route of Mudejar. A string of temples that will surprise the visitor with their








unexpected coffered ceilings, not unlike wooden skies, carefully built piece by piece as if they were complex jigsaws to embellish these houses of prayer. This is an art based on simplicity, recognisable by its use of brick, as can be seen in the churches of San Juan and Santiago, in Alba de

One of the historical places in this land, Los Arapiles, very close to the province capital city, includes signposted routes for the interpretation of this battlefield. This place was the setting for one of the most important battles in the Independence War, marking the end of the Napoleonic dominion





he medieval tower that rises over the town is proof of the importance that the most influential noble house in the history of Spain: the House of Alba. Located by a strategical ford in the River Tormes. Alba became part of history when it was designated the seat for this lineage, which for centuries increased its power and influence. The tower, once part of the fortress built in the highest part of the town, ended up being a luxurious Renaissance palace, where some noteworthy frescoes can still be seen.

But the heritage of Alba de Tormes can also be enjoyed in many other of its corners, such as the church of San Juan, with its amazing group of Romanesque sculptures representing Jesus and the apostles, the Anunciación monastery, Saint Teresa's burial place, Carmus, the Carmelite Museum, which houses valuable works of art, or the "Padre Belda" Museum.

A patchwork of history and saintly footsteps

Visiting the monumental legacy of this town implies walking all over it: from the river banks to the highest part, where stands the impressive tower of the ducal castle. And between one and the other, there is an urban area with many a convent -among them, the one founded by Saint Teresa where her remains lie -, churches and hidden corners that deserve an unhurried tour.

The best way of enjoying the great heritage in Alba de Tormes is to follow the signs set in the most relevant places. That way, the visitor can do the various routes which, with the Plaza Mayor at their heart, can show a lot of what this town has treasured throughout the centuries.
